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Preface

This book contains 10 units. Each unit is composed of 4 parts. The first and also the most important part is a Reading Passage. In each passage, some new words are marked to be practiced in the exercises. After each passage, some relevant questions in various types are provided to check learner's comprehension. The passages in the body of the book are pedagogically arranged in such a way that as the book proceeds, they become longer and more difficult.

The second part deals with a reading strategy in which, firstly, one important technique to improve learner's reading skill is practiced and secondly, to enrich learner's vocabulary, 10 similar words in English and Persian along with a set of exercises are provided and practiced.

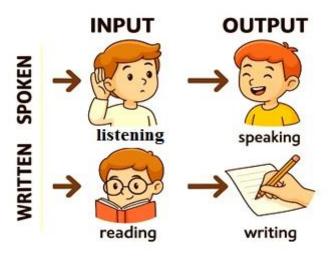
The third part focuses on grammar in two different sub-divisions; at first, one grammatical point and its related questions are reviewed and then, different parts of speech of the words already used in the reading passage will be practiced.

The last part of each unit named "Let's have a break" includes a funny story, a joke or some proverbs and idioms. The role of this part is both as refreshment and at the same time as a learning activity. Psychologically, learners are usually attracted by the things they like. Funny parts draw their attention towards the subject and motivate them to understand better. Consequently, the words mentioned in this part may stick in their minds better, so the purpose behind this part is not mere fun but teaching English through fun. Proverbs also teach students morality. They reflect the way of life, thinking, attitudes, culture, etc. Thus, as a learning strategy, the learners here acquire some valuable statements and at the same time they become familiar with the English vocabulary embedded within these statements.

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Unit One Language and Language Skills

Language is one of the most important methods of human communication. Generally speaking, a language **consists of** a set of words which are used in a structured way to **convey** meaning. People use language to communicate with each other in a society. They **exchange** knowledge, beliefs, wishes, and feelings through it. Every language is an amazing means of communication that **meets the needs** of its own speakers. Most languages have written and spoken forms.

Languages **vary** greatly from region to region. Sometimes the **diversity** is so great that a person may not understand the language of someone from another region, country or **continent**. It is not **surprising** to hear that today about 7000 languages exist in the world. The **native** speakers of these languages range in number from very

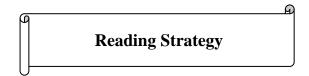
large, with hundreds of millions of speakers, to very small, with fewer than 100 speakers. Among these languages, Chinese has the greatest number of native speakers. More than one billion people in the world speak it. Interestingly, English has fewer native speakers than Chinese, but it is the language of international **communication**, so there are about one billion learners of English all around the world trying to learn it as a **foreign** language. English is the language of business, science, politics and research in the modern world. A lot of university **textbooks** and scientific **journals** are in English. Because of its importance as an international language, people try to learn it.

In learning English, like any other language, four **major** skills should be **acquired**. They are listening, speaking, reading and writing. To learn a language completely and **efficiently**, one has to **gain mastery** of all these skills. In the following, they are **briefly** explained:

- **1.** Listening: It refers to understanding and analyzing the speaker's message in spoken form.
- **2.** Speaking: This skill gives us the ability to **convey** information **verbally** and in a way that the listener can understand.
- **3.** Reading: It is a skill in which the learners look at written symbols (letters, words, etc.) and try to understand the meaning of them.
- **4.** Writing: In this skill, the learners use written symbols (letters, words and **punctuation** marks) to communicate **thoughts** and ideas in a readable form.

Each one of these four skills has its **specific** strategies. Therefore, the learners should pay **particular** attention to them while learning. Knowing about them can help learners improve their communication in both written and spoken forms.

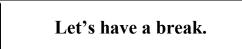

Unit Two Emojis

Emojis are small pictures or **icon**s which are used in digital communication to **express emotion**s, ideas, or **concept**s quickly. They've become an essential part of how people text and chat online. You can find emojis on your smartphone or computer, and people use them in messages, social media posts, and even emails. They make conversations funny and more **expressive**.

Emojis started in Japan in the late 1990s. They were created to add emotions to electronic messages. The common example is the smiley face symbol (: which is still used in digital communication. Now, they are used all over the world, and everyone **recognizes** them. They're like a **universal** language, allowing people from different cultures to understand each other better. There are thousands of emojis **available** today. You can find faces with different expressions, animals, food items, and even places like airports or cities. Some emojis **represent** ideas, like love or friendship, while others can show activities, like playing basketball or taking a walk.

Using emojis can help make communication clearer. For example, if you are joking about something, adding a smiling or laughing emoji can show that you mean it in a funny way. This helps avoid **misunderstanding**, especially in text messages, where **tone** of voice isn't clear. A heart emoji can show love or **affection** and a thumbs-up emoji can show **approval** or agreement, so emojis make it easy to add emotions to your words.

However, it's important to use emojis carefully. Sometimes, people of various backgrounds might **interpret** them in different ways. What seems like a friendly emoji to one person might seem strange or **confusing** to another. It's also possible to use too many emojis in a message but it's a good idea to think about who you're talking to and what they might understand before adding too many emojis. If you fill a text with lots of emojis, it can become difficult to read or understand. Think about using them like **spice**s in cooking—just enough to make it interesting but not so much that it **overpower**s the main message.

In recent years, new emojis have been added to represent more **diverse** people and situations. This helps everyone feel relaxed when using them. Next time when you send a message, try adding some emojis to express how you feel. It's an easy way to add a little extra meaning without using more words.

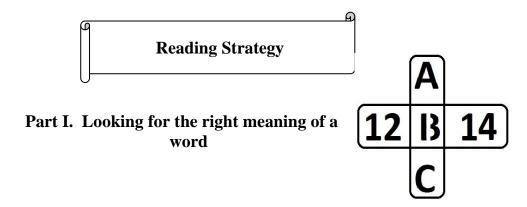
